Course Description:

Guitar

Prerequisite: None

Guitar is designed to offer basic, but intensive, training in the playing of the standard six-string acoustic guitar. This guitar class is designed for high schools students who want to learn to play the guitar and have the opportunity to participate in music performance. This class is for students with no previous guitar experience. The student will learn to read music notation, perform basic chord progressions, and play exercises and short pieces alone and in ensembles. Besides learning to note read and develop the necessary technical skills needed to play the guitar, students will learn the essentials of music theory, improvisation and composition. Listening to guitar music and discussing the guitar's role in music of the past and present are also components of the course. Although all types of music will be heard and played, this course is not a "rock and roll" guitar class. The students will learn to play solos and in ensembles utilizing a variety of styles, including folk, pop, blues and rock. This class will offer both group and individualized instruction and assessment including both supervised and individual practice.

We have guitars for students to use at school for class and individual practice. There are many local music stores that sell guitars if you wish to purchase one for home. Students may check-out a guitar to practice at school during lunch, homeroom and/or before/after school. This must be scheduled in advance with the instructor.

Classroom Expectations:

- 1. Band Room Rules:
 - 1. Treat others as you wish to be treated. Respect others and they will respect yours.
 - 2. Know the rules in the Bridgeport High School Handbook and abide by them.
 - **3.** Come to class promptly and follow the instructions on the board. Do not leave your seat without permission throughout the class period. Sign out/in on the hall-pass sheet whenever you leave the room during class. Hall passes will be limited. Please follow EMERGENCY USE guidelines as reason to be in the hall during class.
 - 4. Come to class with required materials and ready to rehearse within two minutes of the bell. Be in the room *en route* to your seat before the bell rings.
 - 5. Respect others and they will respect you. Take pride in your surroundings. (No food, gum, or drinks in the band room Clean-up after yourself! *Leave No Trace!*)

Discipline Procedure:

The Beginning of Class:

Students will be counted tardy if they are not in the room when the tardy bell rings, but it is important that they not just stand around once they arrive. With 5 minutes between classes, students will need to move quickly through the halls. Immediately upon entering the band room, students need to set about promptly getting their materials together to begin rehearsal. All of your classes will go better if you are ready to learn when you walk in the door.

- 2. Written Assignments (25%)—In class and homework assignments may be assigned. Point values vary depending on the assignment.
- 3. Performance (25%) Each student is expected to perform an appropriate amount of material each grading period. Specific selections will be assigned and evaluated. Recital Performance-Student will be expected to perform for the class (or another forum) periodically. These recitals will include music previously learned by the student in class.
- 4. Quiz/Test Grades (25%)— Written and performance quizzes/tests will be given throughout the semester. Quizzes on material previously presented may be given at anytime without prior notice. For this reason, students are encouraged to take notes and practice regularly.

Make-Up:

Written quizzes, test, and assignments will follow the Harrison County Attendance Policy as stated in the Student Handbook. Extra Credit assignments are available for any student to gain extra points to improve their grade.

Extra Credit:

Students may earn extra credit by presenting a practice log (verified by a parent) or by performing additional technical exercises, sight reading, or solos. Please see Mr. Hayslette to get an assignment.
